




## Dalby Forest Site Guide - Accessible Tours

Deep within the North York Moors National Park, lies huge tracts of forested land. Surrounded by Pickering, Levisham, Fylingdales and Scarborough, they offer exceptional opportunities for recreation and natural history.

Travel 5.5 miles north of Pickering and you'll reach Cropton Forest. Totalling just over 9,000 acres, it contains many walking trails and is perfect for peace and quiet. From the eastern edge, you can catch glimpses of historic steam trains plying back and forth below. Or head outside its southern boundary and visit historic Cropton village and an ancient Roman site.

Towards the southern section of the National Park, you'll find the most popular place - Dalby Forest. Set over 8000 acres, it provides a perfect place to enjoy outdoor activities. There are many waymarked walking and cycling trails – some of which are accessible - while close by Bridestones Moor offers a fascinating moonscape-looking landscape worth exploring. Maps are available at the information and visitor centre close to the Thornton-le-Dale entrance.

## What Can You See?

### Spring

New green growth abounds in the spring, giving the woodlands a fresh, new look. Emerging from the cold winter and basking in warmer temperatures, **Adders**, **Common Lizard** and butterflies such as the **Small Pearl-bordered Fritillary** start appear. **Tree Pipits** fly in from their wintering grounds. Male **Woodcocks** and acrobatic **Northern Goshawks** perform their display flight over their woodland territories.

### Summer

From late April, the increasingly-scarce visitor - the **European Turtle Dove** – and **Restart** start to arrive. Summer also brings the weird churring noise of the **Nightjar** at dusk. Rare **Honey Buzzards** migrate from their wintering grounds while **Sparrowhawks** and **Common Buzzards** are active.

### Autumn

The woodlands turn into a blaze of colour and vegetation dies down making it easier to see **Roe Deer** and other species. **Lesser Redpolls** are more evident as they come down to drink at temporary pools, while **Peacock**, **Tortoise Shell** and **Red Admiral Butterflies** are found more readily in open spaces. Late autumn heading into winter, **Common Crossbills** arrive in parties up to a hundred or more to feed on pine, spruce and larch cones, while **Siskins** gather in great numbers too.

## Winter

Although quieter, there is still much to be seen in the forest. Birds of prey such as **Northern Goshawk**, **Sparrowhawk** and **Common Buzzard** are still very active. Along the rivers and streams, **Grey Wagtails** and the rare **Dipper** fish for food. In the deciduous woodlands, rare **Marsh Tit** can be found or **Willow Tit** in the damper areas. This is also the time of the year when gregarious **Bramblings** flock here in their hundreds.

### Access by car

Take the A169 from Pickering to Whitby and look out for the brown tourist signs. See 'Car Parking' below for more information once you get here.

### Access by public transport

Dalby Forest welcome car-free visitors and offer free admission to those arriving by public transport or bike. Good Journey offers a range of travel planning options and can help with accessibility information.

### **Bus**

The nearest bus stop is located on Whitby Gate for the regular Coastliner bus service. The bus stop is 2.5 miles / 4.0 km from Dalby Forest. The Moorbus operates between July to September and is wheelchair accessible. It will stop within the forest at the Visitor Centre. You'll find more details here:

### **Train**

The nearest train station is Malton. It has step-free access, accessible ticket machines, ramped access on to trains, hearing loops and wheelchairs to hire. More information can be found here: [CLICK HERE](#)

## **Car parking**

There are three accessible parking bays (without hatching) and the main entrance of the visitor centre is accessed via a level access route down a slight decline. The parking is less than 50 metres from the main entrance. Parking is not free.

There is a drop-off point at the main entrance. The drop-off point has a dropped kerb.

Dalby Forest has a transport service, to take visitors from the car park to the main entrance. Their transport service is wheelchair accessible.

## **Access to visitor centre reception, toilets, retail area, indoor seating and café**

You'll find an overview below.

The path to the entrance is level and 2 metres wide or more. The door to the visitor centre is over 1.7 metres wide and opens automatically from the side. There are contrast markings on the doors to make them easier to see.

Inside the centre they have used lots of contrasting colours to help those with visual impairment.

From the main entrance to the ticket desk, access is level and the doorway to get there is over 2 metres wide. The route to the desk 875mm wide, or more, and the height of the desk is 890mm with no clearance underneath. Staff are friendly and helpful and will come out to assist visitors.

The ticket desk is located in the retail area too. There is good visual contrast through the shop and its displays, while there is a wide pathway around the area.

The café is on the same level and is wheelchair accessible. Food is bought at the take away counter. Please note the counter is not lowered but staff can help you.

An accessible indoor toilet is upstairs accessed via a wheelchair-accessible lift. There is another toilet just outside the front door which is also accessible.

## **Hearing Loops**

They have a hearing loop at the visitor centre reception.

## **Assistance dogs**

All dogs include Accessibility dogs are permitted.

## **Toilets**

As mentioned above in the 'Access to visitor centre reception, toilets, retail area, indoor seating and café' section, an accessible indoor toilet is upstairs accessed via a wheelchair-accessible lift. There is another toilet just outside the front door which is also accessible.

## **Cafe**

As mentioned above in the 'Access to visitor centre reception, toilets, retail area, indoor seating and café' section, the café seating area is wheelchair friendly. The counter is not lowered so please ask for support.

## **Outdoor seating and picnic areas**

There is level access from the car park to the picnic area. Some tables have extra space to allow for wheelchair users.

You can bring your own food and eat this in the picnic area.

## **Mobility support**

Dalby Forest has wheelchairs, two mobility scooters and a tramper to hire for free, although you can leave an optional donation to go towards maintenance if you wish. You don't have to pre-book these, but it is advisable to do so. Please ring 01751 460295 to book.

## **Viewing points and accessible trails**

The reception team will provide you with a map detailing accessible routes and can answer any questions you might have.

According to the accessibility guide there are two accessible trails: the Ellerburn Red Trail and the Cross Cliff View Trail/ Bickley Gate Yellow Route. Please double-check with the reception team regarding these trails and any others not included in the guide.

### **Ellerburn Red Trail**

This trail is 2,800 metres long and 2 metres wide. It has a gentle incline in places, but the surface is hard although watch out for some potholes as this is a working forest road. There are seats along the route.

### **Cross Cliff View Trail/ Bickley Gate Yellow Route**

A shorter route at 800 metres, this trail has a hard surface and slight gradient. There are more opportunities to see birds of prey along this route. There are standard, wooden benches to sit on along the way.
